Discussion of a Re-Entry Council in Wayne County

Commissioner Bevan Foster shared his thoughts on a Re-Entry Council in Wayne County to work with individuals released from incarceration in Wayne County who have no job or family to assist them. He introduced Michael Gardner of Triumph Unity Alliance and works with ex-offenders, helping them with 13 life stages. He currently has one house with 6 ex-offenders, with 5 of them currently successfully employed. He said giving them a helping hand and changing their environment changes their situation of “doing what I had to do to survive.” Mr. Gardner is a former corrections officer.

Commissioner Antonio Williams stated the program was valuable and he would like more information.

Vice-Chairman Freeman Hardison, Jr. asked Mr. Gardner to present his game plan and additional information to the Board, and commended him for what he was doing.

Commissioner Barbara Aycock asked if Mr. Gardner had looked into grant funding. He stated the program has only been in existence for two months, but he is searching grant information.

Commissioner Bevan Foster told Mr. Gardner to continue his work with the Sheriff's office and come up with a plan for the Board of Commissioners.

Motion to Award the EMS Ambulance Remount Bid to Southeastern Specialty Vehicles

EMS Director Dave Cuddeback presented information on the bids for the EMS Ambulance Remount, attached hereto as Attachment J.

Upon motion of Commissioner Chris Gurley, the Board of Commissioners unanimously approved awarding the EMS Ambulance Remount bid to Southeastern Specialty Vehicles, the lowest responsive, responsible bidder.

County Manager's Report

County Manager Craig Honeycutt reminded the Board and the public of the vaccine center at the Bussman Building on Dixie Trail. He stated first shots were administered on Mondays and Wednesdays, and second shots on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Anyone age 16 and over is eligible for a vaccine. He encouraged everyone to consider getting the vaccine. Mr. Honeycutt said the 2nd week of budget meetings are in process and the Board of Commissioners will receive the budget from him during the 2nd meeting in May.

Commissioner Barbara Aycock thanked the City of Goldsboro for meeting on sewer issues and thanked Assistant County Manager Chip Crumpler for explaining the information so well. She said the hope is to get a handle on the problem and avoid a moratorium by the City.

Commissioner Joe Daughtery shared his thoughts on Wayne County having a viable Health Department. He said the department has lost 20% of skilled and valued employees due to the facility and said it was time to address that situation.

Commissioner Antonio Williams had no comment.

Commissioner Bevan Foster had no comment.

Vice-Chairman Freeman Hardison, Jr. said there was an uptick in COVID-19 cases in Wayne County and reminded everyone to wear masks and get vaccinated.

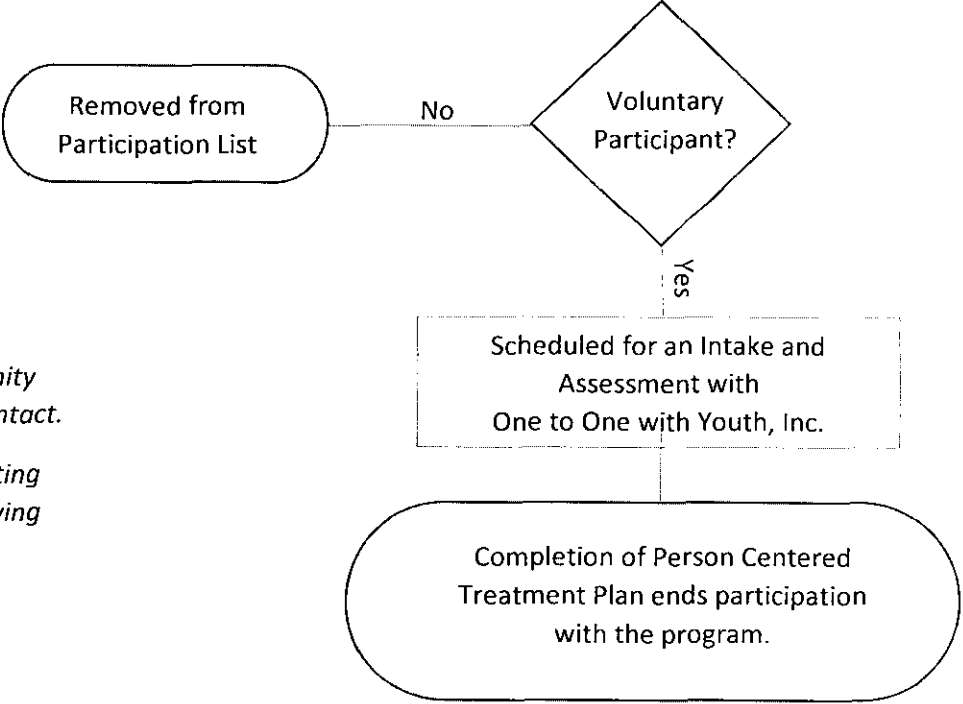
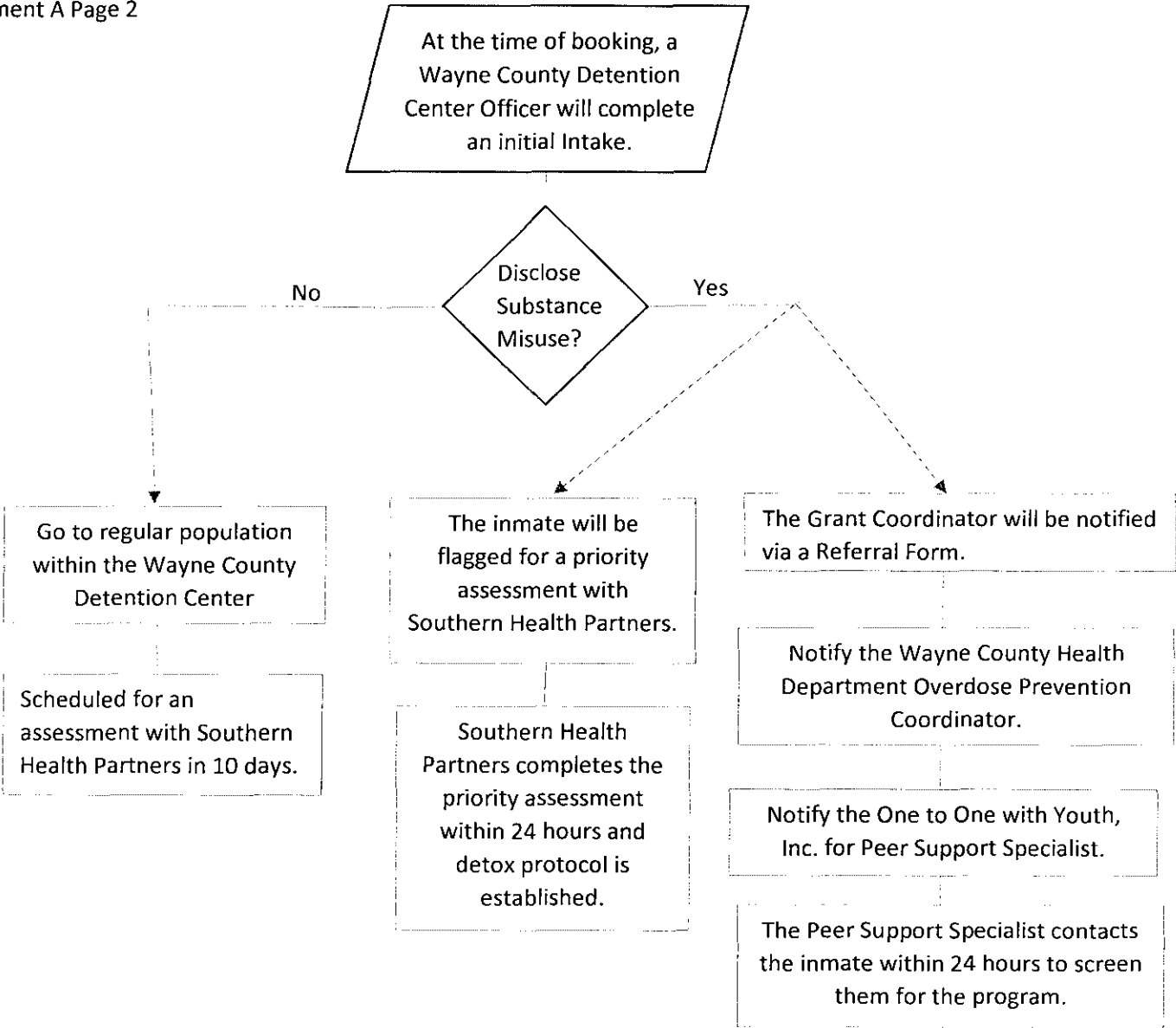

Wayne County Detention Center

Substance Misuse Program

April 20, 2021



**Attempts will be made to reach inmates released into the community prior to Peer Support Specialist contact.*

**Inmates released into Day Reporting Center custody will continue receiving services in addition to the Day Reporting Center Program.*

Wayne County Detention Center Substance Misuse Program

The primary goal of this initiative is to reduce overdose deaths, reduce recidivism, and increase engagement in evidence-based Opioid Use Disorder treatment by developing a continuum of care for individuals while incarcerated and in the community post release.

Wayne County Detention Center

The Wayne County Detention Center (“WCDC”) has hired a Program Coordinator (i.e. Grant Coordinator) to act as a liaison between all five partners listed as well as any others that may ensue over time. The Program Coordinator will establish collaborative efforts toward our opioid epidemic and continue efforts to coordinate services for those suffering from addiction to drug related substances with mental health professionals and Peer Support Specialist (“PSS”). In addition, the Program Coordinator provides project management, alignment, and administrative oversight.

Southern Health Partners

Southern Health Partners will provide the physical, medical history and a behavioral health evaluation of inmates booked within the WCDC.

Their previous Detox Protocol consisted of the following Detox Medications:

1. Ibuprofen 600 mg twice daily x 5	2. Imodium 2 mg twice daily until symptoms subside
3. Phenergan 25 mg twice daily as needed until symptoms subside	4. Clonidine 0.1 mg twice daily as needed for blood pressure until symptoms subside

Now, individuals identified as having OUD are further assessed for Medication-Assisted Treatment (“MAT”) by administering Suboxone, a buprenorphine. Buprenorphine, to include Suboxone, is an opioid agonist/antagonist that blocks other narcotics while reducing withdrawal risk. This process is now facilitated inside the WCDC by a physician with Southern Health Partners. Meanwhile, the nursing staff and Wayne County Detention Officers continue to closely monitor the individual for withdrawal symptoms and provide updates to the program coordinator.

Wayne County Health Department

The Wayne County Health Department (“WCHD”) will bridge the gap between in-custody and community base treatment. The WCHD will also provide naloxone kits and training for individuals upon release from the detention center. In addition, naloxone kits, education, and technical assistance will be offered to government agencies, community-based and public safety organizations, and health-care institutions.

Wayne County Detention Center Substance Misuse Program

One to One with Youth, Inc.

One to One with Youth, Inc. will play a key role in assigning a PSS to work with individuals in recovery that are released from custody. PSS will be assigned to help the individual's transition back into the community by providing assistance with resources such as employment, education, housing, therapy, etc. The individuals desiring PSS services will be required to participate in a Comprehensive Clinical Assessment ("CCA") and Person-Centered Plan ("PCP"). Peer Support Services are evaluated based on the individuals' progress towards their PCP. The PCP is updated monthly to discuss progress/regression of goals; modifications of goals are completed during this time. Once the individual has made progress and completed all interventions identified in their PCP, their goals are deemed achieved.

Day Reporting Center (DRC)

Once approved for pretrial release, DRC will provide 24-hour GPS monitoring supervision as well as coordinate with the jail, attorney, and the courts the pretrial release of the MAT individual from the WCDC. Administering a 7-panel drug test establishes a baseline of drug usage for MAT individuals upon release and will continue every two weeks. Upon release, each individual will report daily to their assigned Pretrial Release Coordinator during the first five days and remain on residential restriction for a total of fourteen days. MAT services will transfer from Southern Health Partners to Carolina Treatment Center as individuals are released.

Failure of a drug test for any illegal drugs, after the baseline test, will cause an intervention to be conducted with the MAT individual, the Substance Abuse Treatment Provider, Pretrial Release Coordinator and the PSS to discuss issues that caused the participants failure of the drug test and to agree on a case plan to address the failure.

The following on site services will be available to each MAT participant released to the DRC.

1. Intensive Outpatient Substance Abuse treatment
2. Individual Therapy
3. GED classes
4. Career Readiness Training
5. Employment Specialist
6. Soft Skills Classes provided by Wayne Community College
7. GPS equipment

The expected timeline of completion varies and depends on the participant's initiatives towards their goals outlined in their PCP. With progress and evaluation measures in place, once the participant has met the goals of their PCP then discussions will begin among all involved to determine if the participant is ready for completion of the program.

WAYNE COUNTY RECOGNITION DAY FOR NATIONAL SERVICE

WHEREAS, the Corporation for National and Community Service is a federal agency that helps more than five million Americans improve the lives of their fellow citizens through service; and

WHEREAS, over 200 volunteers and service members serve Wayne County residents year-round through the WAGES Foster Grandparent and Senior Companion Programs; and

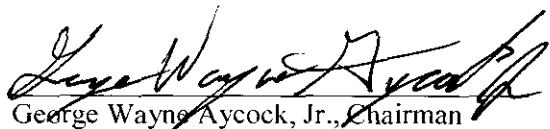

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AGREEMENT

This AGREEMENT is executed this _____ day of _____ 2021, by and between Company, AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC, located at 300 Dixie Trail, Goldsboro, NC 27530, a corporation authorized to do business in the state of North Carolina, (hereinafter “AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC”), and Wayne County a political subdivision of the State of North Carolina, having its principal place of business at 224 E. Walnut Street, Goldsboro NC 27530 (hereinafter the “County”) and the City of Goldsboro a political subdivision of the State of North Carolina, having a principal place of business at 200 North Center Street Goldsboro NC 27530 (hereinafter the “City”).

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC desires to install certain machinery and equipment in its existing facility located in Goldsboro, Wayne County NC, representing a total non-depreciated investment of at least \$400,000 in personal property, and to create at least ninety-six (96) new jobs at this facility on or before December 31, 2021, with incremental achievement goals starting December 31, 2020; and

WHEREAS, AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC shall incur certain costs for installation of these improvements; and

WHEREAS, the addition of these improvements will expand the County tax base through increased ad valorem tax value created as a consequence of capital investment in real property and machinery and equipment being brought into the County and City; and

WHEREAS, the North Carolina Department of Commerce has granted AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC a grant in the amount of \$125,000 from the One North Carolina Fund which requires a local government match of \$42,000.

WHEREAS, the County and City recognize that increased ad valorem tax revenues will be generated as a consequence of this business venture and investment, and that grants by the County and City would be an incentive for such investment by AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC to assist the same pay a portion of the costs of the investment, and that such incentives be designated as an “Economic Development Grant” to AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC in the combined amount of Forty two thousand, (\$42,000); and

WHEREAS, the parties hereto wish to reduce their understanding regarding the details of the Economic Development Grant and AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC’s performance to this agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, for the mutual considerations noted hereinafter, the sufficiency of which are hereby acknowledged, the parties do hereby contract and agree as follows:

I. Economic Development Incentives.

AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC will incur costs in adding machinery and equipment as well as additional real property at their current facility and the County and City will realize economic benefits due to the expansion of the ad valorem tax base. As an incentive for AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC to invest in machinery and equipment and real property at its existing site in accordance with NCGS 158-7.1, the County and City shall provide to AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC the incentives set forth herein in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement. The County and City each shall provide an Economic Development Grant to AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC with an estimated value of Twenty-one Thousand,(\$21,000); with such a grant to be made available to AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC as set forth in Exhibit A.

- A. The County and City shall pay to AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC in installments a total grant of Forty-two Thousand, (\$42,000); as shown on, and in accordance with terms and conditions described in, Exhibit A to this Agreement (the “**County Performance Grant**”).
- B. The amounts paid in the attached Exhibit A shall represent the \$42,000 local government match under the One North Carolina Fund Grant as required by the North Carolina Department of Commerce.

II. Representations.

The County and City represents and warrants that (a) they have the power and authority to bind themselves to the requirements of this Agreement and (b) this Agreement is executed under the authority granted to the County and City under North Carolina General Statute 158-7.1; The Local Development Act of 1925, as amended.

III. Miscellaneous Provisions.

- A. Governing Law. This Agreement has been drafted and shall be interpreted under the laws of the State of North Carolina and in the event any provision is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unenforceable or unconstitutional, all other provisions shall remain in full force and effect.
- B. Binding Agreement. The parties hereto acknowledge that this Agreement and the foregoing actions and grants each represent binding contractual agreements among the parties hereto and that AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC is acting in reliance upon this Agreement and the provisions and grants provided herein in its decision as to whether it will expand its investment in Goldsboro/Wayne County, North Carolina.
- C. Assignment. This Agreement shall be assignable by AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC to any entity that is controlled by controls or under common control with AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC or in the case of a sale of substantially all the operating assets of the facility, this Agreement may be assigned to the purchaser of the facility so long as the purchaser complies with this Agreement.
- D. Survival. The contractual commitments provided for herein and made by the parties hereto shall be deemed to continue into the future, survive, and remain binding upon future elected officials fully permitted under applicable law.

- E. Force Majeure. AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC shall not assume any responsibility for any event or failure to act that is due to any cause in whole or in part that is beyond AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC's control, even if advised of same, foreseeable or in contemplation of the parties, including without limitation force majeure, the public enemy, fire, flood, earthquake, hurricane, strike or labor disputes, boycott, the inability to obtain raw materials, labor or transportation, the loss of any public or private supplied utilities, the regulations issued by any government or any of its agencies, acts of God, or any other cause similar or dissimilar to the foregoing.
- F. Entire Agreement. This writing contains the entire agreement between the parties hereto and may be amended only by writing signed by all parties hereto.

Calculation Methodology:

AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC’s performance against the job creation, job maintenance, and the capital investment goals shall be reviewed by the County and City after submission by AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC before September of each year, beginning in CY 2020 for performance year 2021. The total amount of capital investment and job increases as of January 1st of that year shall be calculated; the total for each shall be expressed as a percentage of the respective total projected goal. The average of the two percentages shall be the achievement percentage of capital investment and job creation and the grant funds that shall be awarded in and for each calendar year based on that achievement, subject to the County and City Grant Annual New increment maximum and the following. Should the average percentage of the cumulative projected goal capital investment and job increase be less than 100% as of January 1st of any given year, the County and City shall accrue the amount of funds budgeted but unearned and such funds shall be paid out in the first year AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC attains each year at least 100% of its cumulative projected goals, in addition to paying the new increment amount of funds budgeted for that year. The payments by the County and City should AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC be current in all tax payments for that fiscal year and to the extent provided above that performance goals be met, shall be made by September 30th of each year beginning in 2022, for calendar year 2021. This grant shall expire on December 31, 2024. For clarification, if AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC does not submit performance data for a year before September of the normal review year, the funds budgeted will accrue and be reviewed by the County and City during the review year following AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC’s submission, but not after December 31, 2024 (that is, when the grant expires).

“Budget” unless otherwise agreed in this Agreement, the County and City shall approve a budget for the specific grant amount offered to AP Emissions and Technologies, LLC by July 1st of each year that the respective grant is offered, for payment by the agreed-upon date.

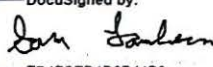

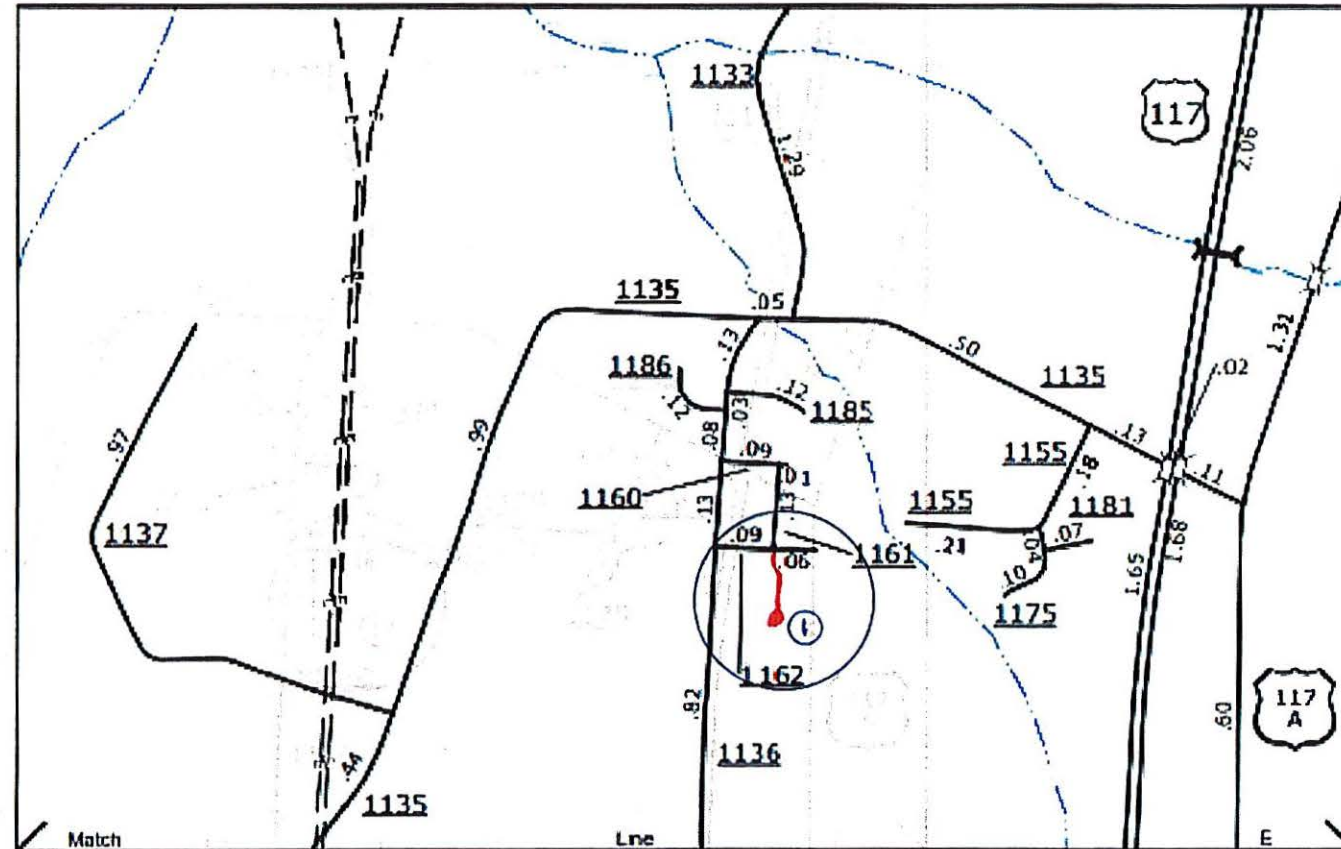


Wayne County – Vicinity Map

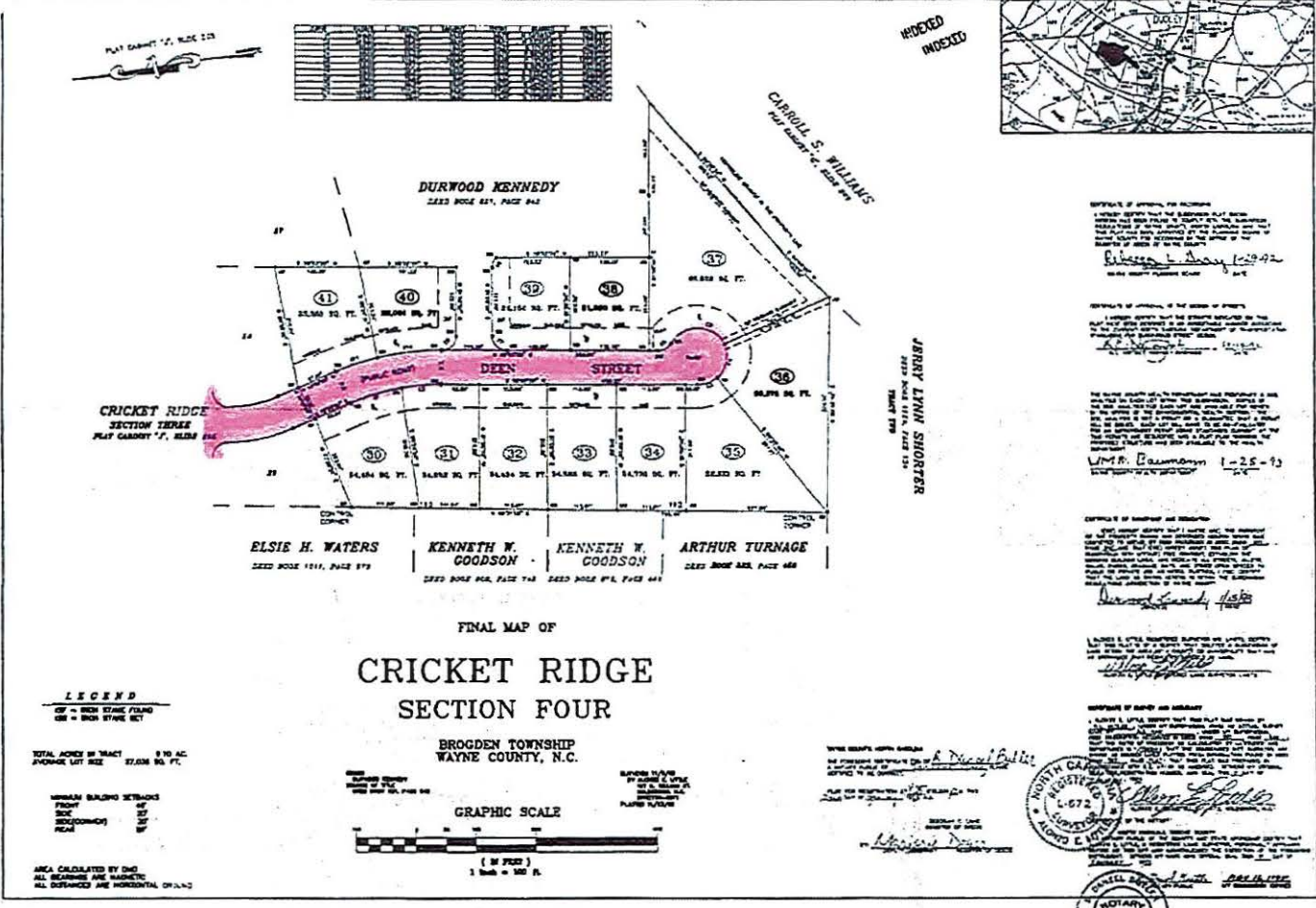

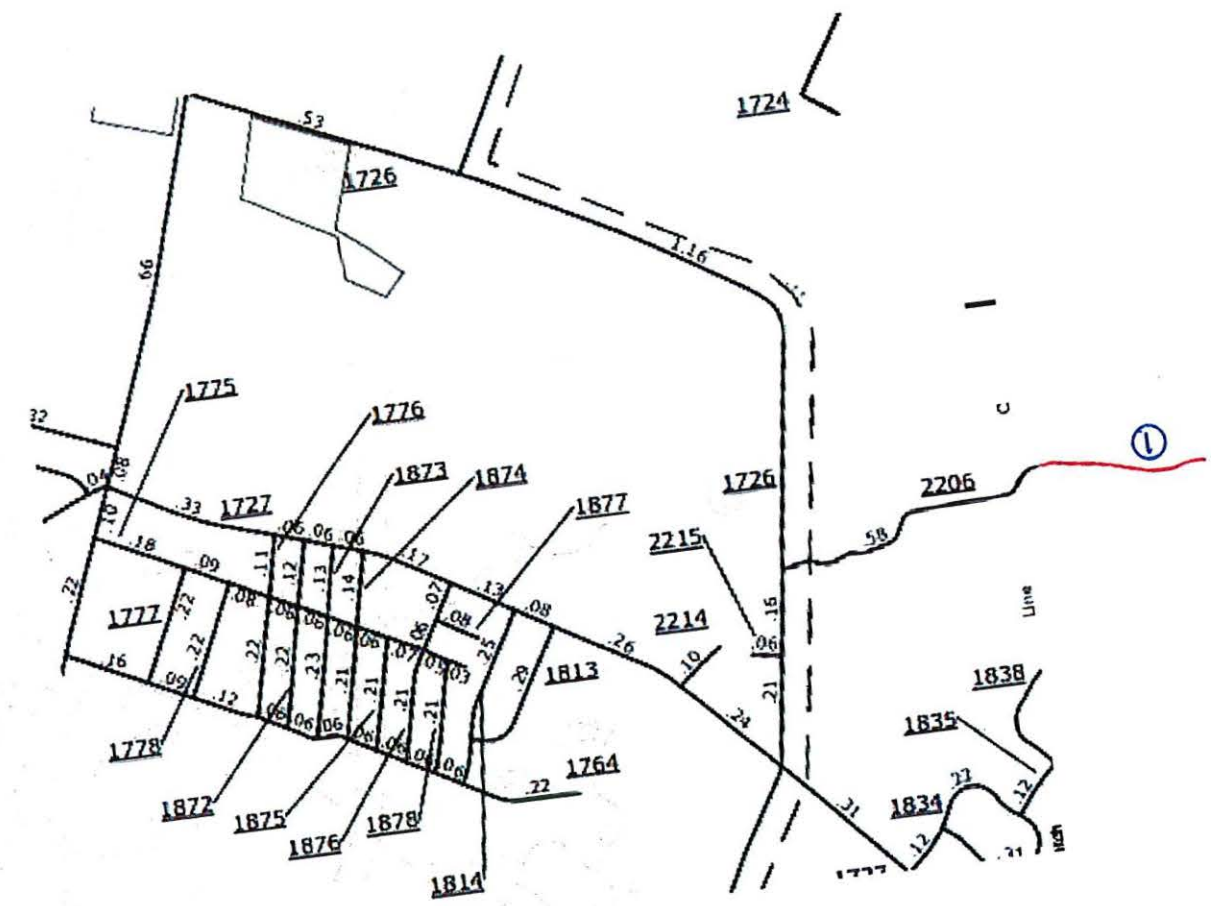

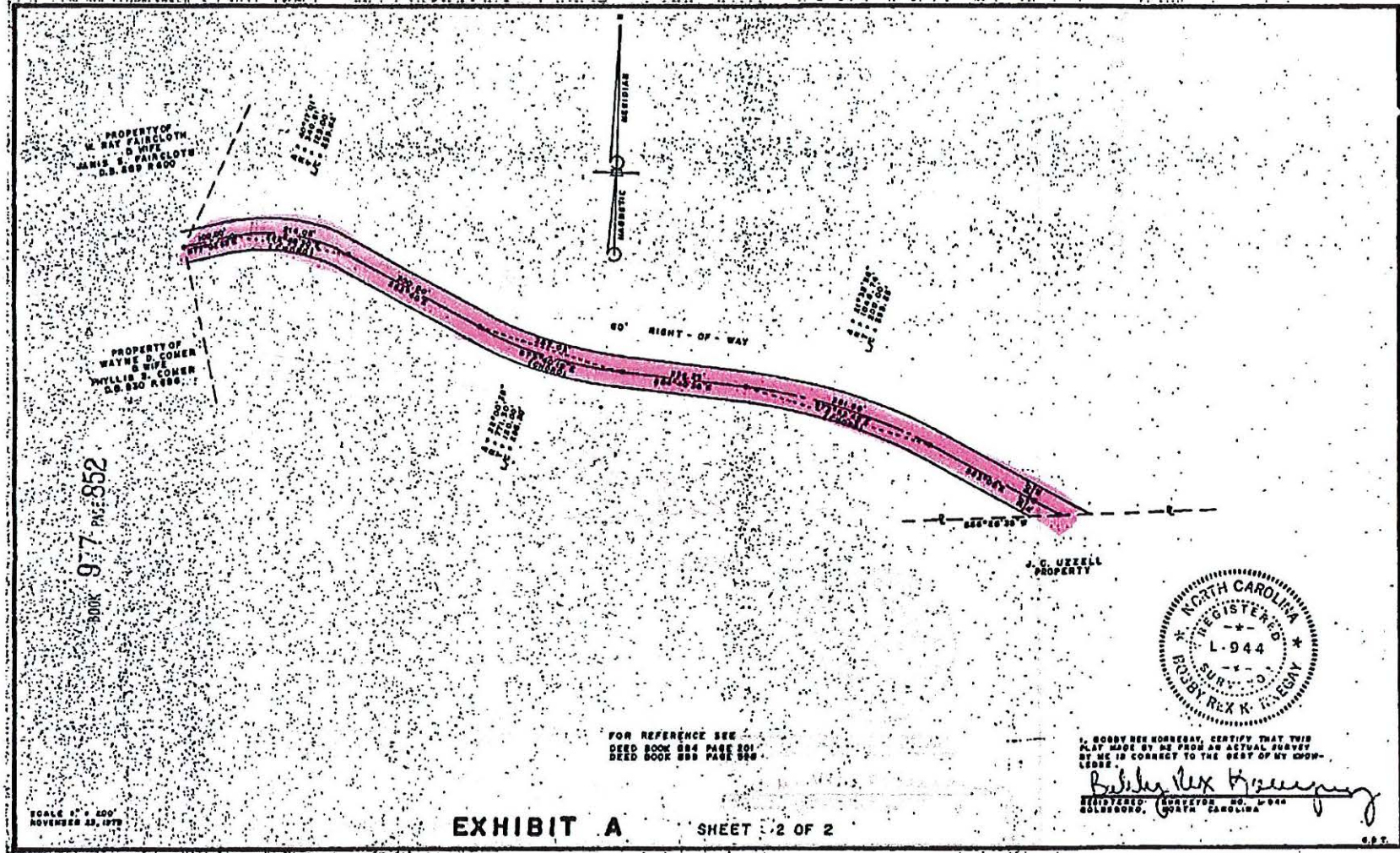


Wayne County – Vicinity Map

The subdivision is located off Dollard Town Road (SR 1727), $\frac{3}{4}$ of a mile east of its intersection with Lake Wackena Road (SR 1728). The property is within the Outer Horizontal Height District with the average lot size at 17,390 sf. Building lots will utilize public water and onsite septic. 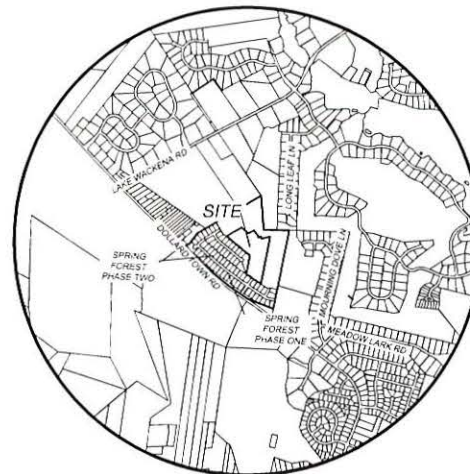

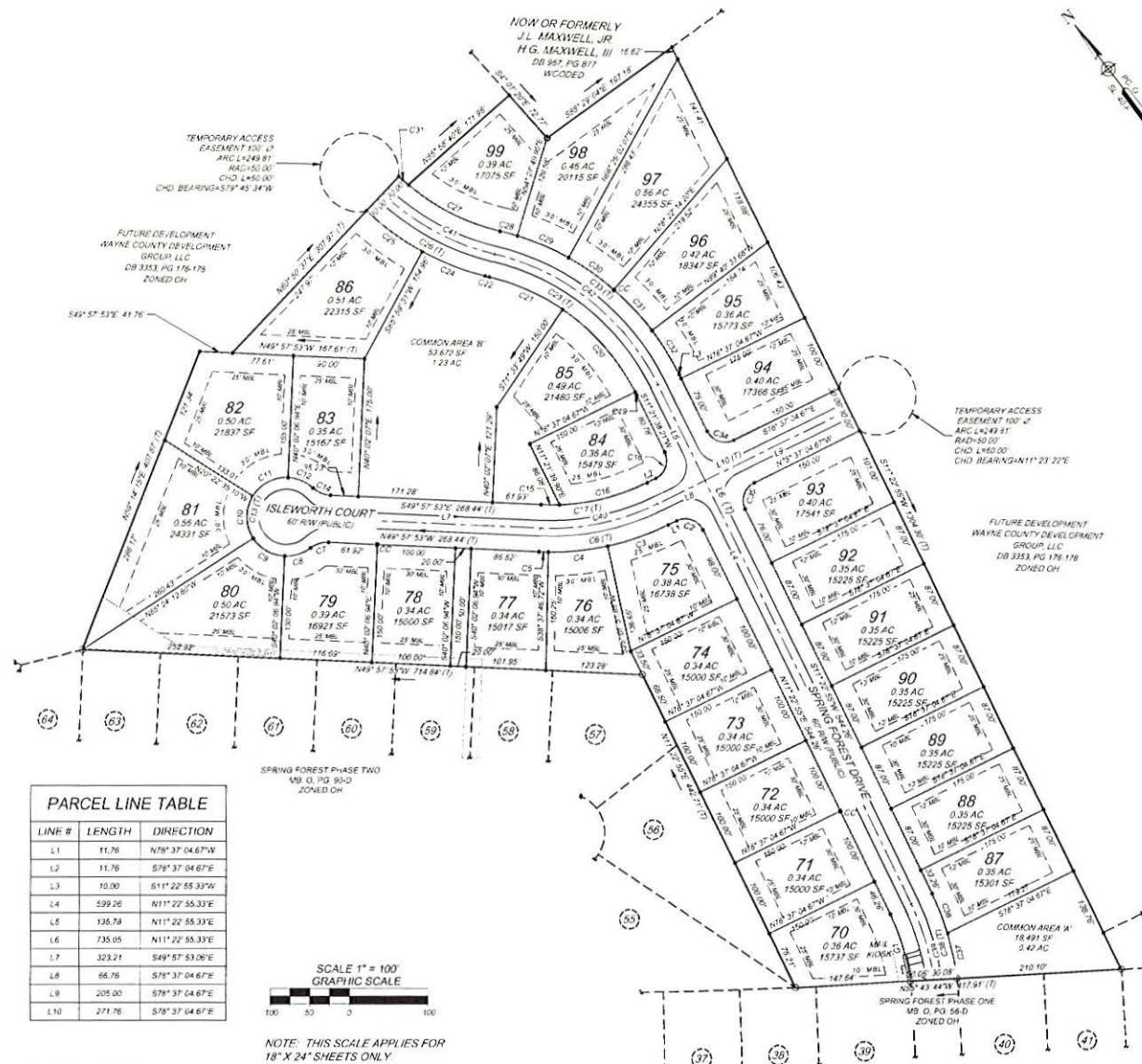

Executive Summary for 2021-22 County Plan**

The **Wayne** County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC), in fulfillment of the duties and responsibilities as set forth in the General Statutes of the State of North Carolina, has completed the activities required to develop this County Plan for FY 2021- through FY 2022.

The JCPC has identified the issues and factors which have an influence and impact upon delinquent youth, at-risk youth, and their families in **Wayne** County. Further, the JCPC has identified the strategies and services most likely to reduce and prevent delinquent behavior.

JCPC Action Plan: An Action Plan to impact delinquent behavior (included in this document) has been developed. With the goals, objectives and corresponding outcomes, the JCPC proposes to:

Prevent and reduce delinquent behaviors

Increase public awareness of delinquency prevention

Provide a continuum of community resources to address delinquent and at-risk behaviors

Priorities for Funding: Through a risk and needs assessment as well as a resource assessment, the JCPC has determined that the following services are needed to reduce and prevent delinquency in **Wayne** County.

1. Mentoring
2. Parent and Family Skill Building
3. Interpersonal/Social Skill Building
4. Restitution/ Community Service Program
5. Teen Court
6. Juvenile Structured Day
7. Home Based Family Counseling
8. Substance Abuse Assessment/Treatment Program
9. Mediation
10. Vocational Skills

Monitoring and Evaluation: Each program funded by the JCPC has been monitored. The monitoring results and program outcomes evaluations were considered in making funding allocation decisions.

The JCPC continues to conduct implementation monitoring of its action plan and its funded programs on a biannual basis.

Monitoring Forms are on file in the Area Office for the following programs:

- ***Restorative Justice for Wayne Juveniles - Teen Court, Restitution, Mediation***
- ***Juvenile Structured Day – Education and Skills***
- ***Transition Re-entry – Home Based Family Counseling***
- ***Building Peace in Schools – Social Skills and Mentoring***

Family Preservation Alternatives to Commitment was also monitored by the JCPC though the program is not funded with regular JCPC allocation.

Funding Recommendations: Having published a Request for Proposals for these needed services for a minimum of thirty (30) days, the JCPC has screened the submitted proposals and has determined which proposals best meet the advertised needed services.

As required by statute, the JCPC recommends allocation of the NC Department of Public Safety/ Division of Juvenile Justice (DPS/DJJ) Funds to the following Programs in the amounts specified below for FY 2021-2022:

Part I. Risk

The Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC) reviewed data gleaned from the Juvenile Risk Assessment instrument administered by Juvenile Court Counselors after juveniles are referred with a complaint alleging that a delinquent act has occurred and prior to adjudication of the juvenile. The Juvenile Risk Assessment is an instrument used to predict the likelihood of the juvenile being involved in future delinquent behavior.

- 1) Higher risk youth;
- 2) School behavior and attendance concerns;
- 3) Prior referrals and adjudications;
- 4) Gang association and membership;
- 5) Substance abuse needing assessment and treatment;
- 6) Parents willing but unable to supervise.

Part II. Needs

The JCPC also reviewed data gleaned from the Juvenile Needs Assessment instrument administered by Juvenile Court Counselors prior to court disposition of a juvenile and at 90-day intervals through the period of court supervision. The Juvenile Needs Assessment is an instrument used to examine a youth's needs in the various domains of his life: The Individual Domain, The School Domain, The Peer Domain, and the Community Domain. This instrument was designed to detect service intervention needs as an aid in service planning.

- 1) School behavior problems;
- 2) Gang association and membership;
- 3) Mental Health/Substance Abuse concerns;
- 4) Family criminal history;
- 5) Family use of alcohol and drugs;
- 6) Marginal parenting skills.

Part III. Summary of the Existing Community Resources

The completed Resource Continuum is included in the full county plan.

Part IV. Summary of Gaps and Barriers in the Continuum of Services

- Educational credit for youth out of school or GED/HS Equivalency programming for those lawfully out of school continues to be a need. These programs may exist, but the case management necessary to assist a juvenile in following through to completion will continue to be an ongoing need.
- Vocational services and appropriate case management for older teens involved with the juvenile justice system.

Part V. Proposed Priority Services for Funding

The JCPC compared the services needed to address the elevated Juvenile Risk Factors and Juvenile Needs with services currently available in the community. Services which are currently available in the community and sufficient to meet the needs of court involved youth or those youth most at risk for court involvement are not considered as a priority for JCPC funding.
